

Fifteen of the twenty-three countries are labeled on the map. Puerto Rico, which belongs to the U.S., is also labeled.

The fifteen countries include

- the Bahamas, Canada, Mexico, and the United States;
- the Central American countries of Belize, Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, Nicaragua, and Panama; and
- the Greater Antilles island nations of Cuba, Dominican Republic, Haiti, and Jamaica.

Note: The eight countries and eight dependencies in the Lesser Antilles are not labeled on the map. The eight countries include Antigua and Barbuda, Barbados, Dominica, Grenada, St. Kitts and Nevis, St. Lucia, St. Vincent and the Grenadines, and Trinidad and Tobago.
